Conceiving the Architecture of Power: the Building of the Basilica of St Peter in Renaissance Rome

This illustrated lecture will discuss the conception of a new basilica of St Peter by Pope Julius II. Bramante's design, with its references to ancient architecture, was both a tribute to St Peter and a monument to the ambition and power of Pope Julius II; but, after his death, subsequent popes and architects changed that vision. The result, after 120 years of construction, is the church we see today.
