Guides, Guardrails, and Good Behaviour: Canada's Liberal Democratic System

Liberal democratic systems are arguably the best in the world for preserving political freedom, equality of political rights, and promoting political participation. They tend to have strong institutions, the trust of citizens, and leaders who act in good faith. If they are ever to be toppled, it would be in some violent uprising or coup d'état, right? Not so anymore. Democratic systems, even liberal democratic systems, can be fragile. Without respected guides, strong guardrails, and good behaviour, their foundations can be slowly eroded and, steadily over time, they morph into something else altogether - generally not for the better. This lecture will provide an overview of liberal democracy in Canada and identify areas where we need to be vigilant to ensure our political system remains robust.
